## Collection Overview

**Creator:** Davis, Ada, 1929-2009

### **Administrative/Biographical History:**

Ada Davis was born in Cumberland, Maryland in 1929. She received her nursing diploma from Kings County Hospital School of Nursing in Brooklyn, New York in 1949. In the early 1950s she worked at Kings County Hospital, as a staff nurse in the operating room and Head Nurse on a couple of surgical units . She worked as a staff nurse full-time in the operating room at Gallinger/DC General Hospital from 1953 to 1954 and part-time on the Medical-Surgical units at Suburban Hospital in Bethesda, MD from 1958 to 1960. From 1960 to 1970 she worked part-time in the Medical-Surgical units and Newborn Nursery at Sibley Memorial Hospital in Washington, DC. She worked part-time in the OR Recovery Room, Medical-Surgical units, and Newborn Nursery at Columbia Hospital for Women in Washington, DC from 1970 to 1977. She earned her BS in Nursing in 1973 and her MS in Public Health Nursing in 1974, both from the University of Maryland School of Nursing in Baltimore, MD. From 1974 to 1977 she was an Assistant Professor in the undergraduate program at the University of Maryland ; she was an Assistant Professor in the Primary Care Graduate Department at the UMD School of Nursing from 1977 to 1979. She earned her certification as an Adult Nurse Practitioner in 1978 and her Ph.D. in 1979. From 1978 to 1982 she worked as a part-time Nurse Practitioner at the Primary Care Medical Clinic at the University of Maryland Hospital in Baltimore. She was the Chairman of the Department of Nursing at the College of Notre Dame in Baltimore from 1979 to 1982. She was both the Director of the Nursing Administration in Health Services Graduate Program and the Associate Dean and Director of the Graduate Program at Georgetown University School of Nursing from 1982 to 1987. From 1987 to 1993 she was a Nurse Consultant to the Nurse Practitioner and Nurse-Midwifery Grant Program of the Division of Nursing at the US Department of Health and Human Services Public Health Service's Bureau of Health Professions. She was Associate Professor and Director of Baccalaureate Programs at the Johns Hopkins University School of Nursing from 1993 to 2001. Following her retirement from this position, she worked as nursing publications editor at JHUSON, senior editor of the American Nurses Credentialing Committee in Washington , and an assistant in the religious education office at St. Jane Frances De Chantal Catholic Church in Bethesda. She

published many books, including "John Gibbon and his Heart-Lung Machine" (1991) and "Advanced Practice Nurses: Education, Roles, Trends" (1997); she was also the associate editor of the "Hopkins Family Health Guide" (1998). She was listed in Who's Who in American Nursing several times between 1984 and 1996 and was elected to membership in the New York Academy of Sciences in 1994. She was also a member of the American Public Health Association, the American College of Nurse Practitioners, the International Biographical Association, the American Historical Association, and the Sigma Theta Tau National Nursing Honor Society, among other organizations. She died in 2009.

**Scope and Content:**

The Ada Davis Collection consists primarily of materials related to various projects. An important part of the collection is a series of audio tapes of nursing history oral interviews. Biographical information consists primarily of a large binder documenting her activities and publications, as well as some of her old nursing books. The Johns Hopkins University materials include an overview of the Nightingale Collection and administrative materials related to Johns Hopkins Nursing. Includes materials related to lectures given, including audio tapes and slides. Also included are paper materials, audio tapes, and photographs related to conferences attended, as well as audio tapes and other materials related to her projects on John Gibbon and John Kirklin.

John Gibbon was a Civil War general on the Union side and head of the "Iron Brigade." He was also the great-uncle of John Heysham Gibbon, inventor of the heart-lung machine.

The influence of specific faculty members during clinical and social interactions is discussed. The role of the Alumni Association is reviewed, outlining its historical significance in the development of the school as well as its support of students and its current roles with alumni and the school. She reviews her educational progress post-graduation, her path to becoming a faculty member and the philosophy and future plans for nursing education at JHUSON.

**Scope and Content:** K. Virginia Betzold recalls her education and work history prior to entering the Johns Hopkins Hospital School of Nursing including secretarial training at Strayer College. She discusses her student experiences, specifically in the operating room. She then reviews her first several nursing positions at JHH and further education at Teachers College, Columbia for a masters degree. She discusses efforts to establish a university-based nursing program at JHU, her involvement in the 75 anniversary of the JHH Nurses Alumnae Association, additional teaching positions at JHHSON and her year-long experience as an American Nurses' Association representative to the Florence Nightingale International Foundation. This effort prepared nurses from other countries to establish training schools similar to those in England and the US.

**Scope and Content:** Margaret Courtney discusses leadership differences of Johns Hopkins Hospital School of Nursing Directors Wolf and Price. She outlines factors leading to the closure of the JHHSON including a shift to baccalaureate education resulting in less qualified applicants, broader opportunities for women, lack of financial support and resistance from the University to open a baccalaureate-based school. Reasons for University resistance included program costs, male-only education at JHU, a belief that nursing applicants could not meet University academic requirements, and a lack of doctorally-prepared nursing faculty. Dr. Courtney credits Dr. Heysell's support of a three-hospital consortium and Jacqueline Baldick's development efforts for assuring financial security of the JHUSON.

**Scope and Content:** Betty Cuthbert outlines her path to nursing school including two years of pre-med courses at University of Miami in Ohio. She discusses the educational philosophy at Johns Hopkins Hospital School of Nursing that emphasized asking questions rather than simply following orders. She notes that Hopkins-educated nurses were recognized as organized, "bossy" and outspoken. She recognizes the need to understand organizational behavior and finances to achieve change. She reviews changes within the Hospital-based nursing program during her time as a student and faculty member. She compares the administrative styles of the Johns Hopkins Hospital School of Nursing Directors, Anna Wolf and Mary Ann Price. Ms. Cutbert outlines the reasons for delayed development of a baccalaureate school of nursing at Hopkins including: 1) University focus on graduate education; 2) gender expectations 3) perceived poor SAT performance by women, and; 4) space, as well as her role in attempting to develop a collegiate school. The development of the School of Allied Health Services, Nutting Fund money issues and the achievement of a consortium-based baccalaureate nursing program are explored.

She details the national trends and changes in the nursing profession from the 1950s to 1970s and the responses to these changes by the diploma-based school and its leaders. She compares the personal and leadership qualities of Johns Hopkins nursing leaders Anna Wolf, Mary Price, K. Virginia Betzold and Margaret Courtney as well as her relationship with each. She discusses her roles within the school from 1950-1973 and evolution of student characteristics and expectations during her tenure.

**Scope and Content:** Dean Carol Gray describes her arrival from University of Texas to initiate a baccalaureate nursing program feasibility study at Johns Hopkins University and phase out the University's Evening College RN to BSN program. She notes that a consortium of three hospitals: Johns Hopkins, Church Home, and Sinai were central to initial funding and assuring clinical sites for the new baccalaureate school of nursing. She identifies key SON faculty including Martha Hill, Stella Shiber and Elaine Larson and development director, Jacqueline Baldick, as important to insuring the success of the program and further development of master's and doctoral programs. She describes the school goals of clinical expertise for both faculty and students and nursing research in areas of clinical need.

**Scope and Content:** Anna Flatley describes her parents' immigration from Poland and her decision to move from a small coal town in West Virginia to the Johns Hopkins Hospital School of Nursing. She speaks of student life in the late 1930s, her interactions with many doctors and nurses while both a student and graduate and her 39 years as a nurse at Hopkins. She began her career in the OB/GYN operating room and later moved to Pediatrics as the department was transitioning from Harriet Lane to the new Children's Medical and Surgical Center where she assisted with initial organization of clinical care. She later worked in staff development and retired from Hopkins in 1979. She discusses the need for continuing education and the establishment of a scholarship fund in her name at JHUSON. Finally, she speaks of her active life and two

marriages.

He noted that the school was short lived for several reasons: 1) high overhead, 2) conflict between Dean Peterson and Director of the nursing program, Kay Partridge, and 3) an unwillingness to internally fund the school when external funding ended. He then notes his support of Carol Gray to complete a feasibility study for a baccalaureate school of nursing within the University and his desire for her to become Dean. He notes that he was the creator of the new school through development of a consortium of three hospitals (Hopkins, Church Home and Sinai) to provide initial financial and clinical support thus bypassing the need for University financial support. He notes his central role in developing the charter and mission of the school and the delicate balance needed between the hospitals' and faculty's responsibilities.

**Scope and Content:** Dr. John W. Kirklin, a cardiac surgeon, is interviewed by Dr. Ada Davis regarding his career and accomplishments spanning five decades. He first

describes the evolution of cardiac surgery beginning in the 1920s to treat restrictive pericarditis, in the 1930s to treat patent ductus arteriosus and coarctation of the aorta and in the 40s to treat mitral stenosis and atrial septal defect (ASD). He notes that hypothermia and cardiac arrest were used prior to cardiopulmonary bypass to facilitate cardiac surgery and then details the evolution of cardiopulmonary bypass including cross circulation using a child's mother to oxygenate blood and then the development of various heart-lung machines designed by manufacturers such as IBM and General Motors. While at Mayo Clinic, Dr. Kirklin describes visiting surgeons developing and using these and other machines in Toronto (Dr. William T. Mustard), Detroit and Philadelphia (Dr. Gibbon at Thomas Jefferson). He believed that the vertical screen oxygenator, developed by Gibbon and build by IBM, held the most promise and, through collaboration with them, developed the Mayo-Gibbon heart-lung machine. He credits Dr. Gibbon with doing the first ASD repair using a heart-lung machine and lauds Dr. Lillehei's successful infant ventricular septal defect (VSD) repair in 1954 using cross circulation. He then discusses the outcomes of two series of surgeries using the Mayo-Gibbon heart-lung machine, first using dogs resulting in successful outcomes in 9 of 10 cases and then with a group of 8 pediatric patients requiring VSD repair resulting in a 50% death rate. However, he notes that death rates declined to 20% in the second year and 10% in the third year.

The use of cardiopulmonary bypass to facilitate cardiac surgery expanded from congenital heart defects in the pediatric population to treatment of valvular disease in the 1960s and extended to coronary artery disease in the 1970s; Dr. Kirklin performed many of these surgeries over his career. In 1966 he established the Institute of Cardiac Surgery at the University of Alabama retiring in 1987. When asked to identify his major career achievements he listed: 1) developing an organized body of scientific information about cardiac surgery, 2) developing several cardiac surgery operations/techniques, 3) helping patients, 4) being an active surgeon. On the second tape Dr. Kirklin describes the development of the pacemaker by Drs. Lillehei and Bakken, discusses his role in returning Dr. Lillehei to professional recognition among his colleagues and lists qualities for success: stubbornness, determination and intelligence. Finally he reviews his current professional activities including an active research portfolio, development of clinical guidelines for cardiopulmonary bypass grafting and revision of his cardiac surgery text.
